




Absentee Voting for Soldiers - 1864





Absentee Voting for Soldiers - Federal Laws 1942 & 1944






Changes in Voting Modes 1996 - 2022

Chronology for Mostly-Mail States



1998: Oregon

2011: Washington (total: 2)

2013 Colorado (total: 3)

2019: Utah and Hawaii (total: 5)

2021: California, Nevada, Vermont, DC (total: 8 +DC)

Usual Progression for Mostly-Mail States



First: Allow no-excuse absentee voting

Second: Create a permanent absentee voter list

Third: Allow small elections (like special districts) to be all-mail

Fourth: Allow counties to decide

Fifth: Go statewide


