Jackson Brainerd, program principal, Fiscal Affairs Program, NCSL

Jackson Brainerd is a program principal with NCSL's Fiscal Affairs Program, which provides state legislators and staff with outreach and policy analysis on a wide range of state fiscal issues. In this capacity, he oversees state tax and economic development policy and has authored many articles and publications on these subjects. He also staffs NCSL's Task Force on State and Local Taxation and its Budgets and Revenue Standing Committee. Jackson graduated from Colorado College with a bachelor's degree in political science.

Jeff Chapman, director, State Fiscal Health, The Pew Charitable Trusts

Jeff Chapman directs Pew's state fiscal health initiative. Through cutting-edge research and customized technical assistance, he and his team help states maintain a balanced budget, prepare for downturns, invest in long-term economic growth, and strengthen local governments. Ben Husch, federal affairs advisor, State-Federal Relations, NCSL

Ben Husch serves as the federal affairs advisor for Natural Resources and Infrastructure for NCSL. In this role, he leads NCSL's lobbying and advocacy work on transportation, environment, energy and agriculture issues before both Congress and the administration. He joined NCSL in March 2012 after nearly four years with the National Association of State Budget Officers.
