

Pieces of the pie (pre-COVID)






- Temporary Assistance for Needy Families

(\$ in billions)




Grants play a minor role in federal spending



Grants to State and Local Governments in Constant Dollars, as Share of Federal Outlays (\$ in billions)







Federal Funds as a Share of State Spending



Determinants of state grant funding






How the four factors translate to dollars




Grant Funding Per Capita, FY 2022





Health dominates




Medicaid is the largest grant, by far




Largest Federal Grants, FY 2022










Similarly, most grants are non-formula, but most funding is distributed by formula







More grant distinctions

Categorical

- Formula or competitive
- Prescriptive
- Many in number

Block

- Formula
- Flexible
- Few in number





Matching

- Share of total costs borne by recipient
- May be in cash or in kind, depending on program
- Typically ranges from 5%-50%

MOE

- Level of spending recipient must provide
- Often tied to spending in a prior/base year
- Related to requirement that federal funds supplement--and not supplant--state funds

Shutdown ahead?

 Congress has not enacted partial- or full-year appropriations for FY 2024 (see <u>Budget Brief 23-21</u>)

Discretionary programs:

- New funding will not become available
- Whether a program will continue to operate depends on several factors
- Advance appropriations and contract authority insulated from shutdown

Mandatory programs:

- Programs that bypass the appropriations process are protected
- Appropriated entitlements could be affected
- Expiring programs at risk
