Brief Overview

- Serve youth from 0-21, with a few exceptions for Sickle Cell Disease Program and Virginia Bleeding Disorders Program
- Close relationship with Newborn Screening, referrals for care coordination services required after confirmation

- Relationship with VA Department of Education
- Programs based on core outcomes for CYSHCN (Maternal and Child Health Bureau)
 - Medical Home
 - Transition

Brief Overview, “The Big Three”

- **State Plan for CYSHCN in Virginia Administrative Code-** Sets expectations, describes scope of unit/programs, makes CYSHCN a priority, based on Title V, Maternal and Child Block Grant
- **Funding-** Federal Block Grant Funds and General Funds
- **Critical Public-Private Partnerships-** Infrastructure, contractual partnerships expand service floor

- 6,412 served by above programs (FY21)

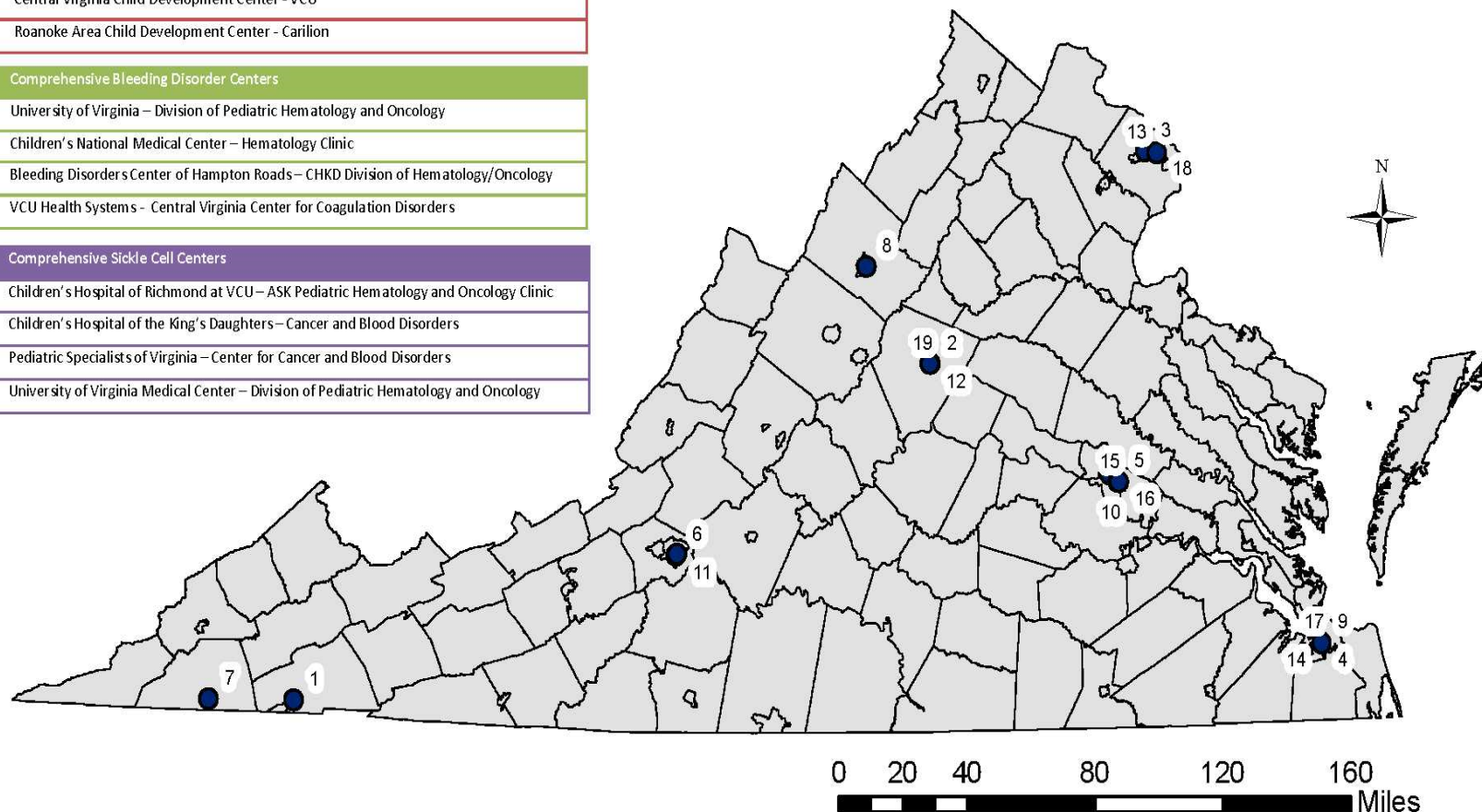

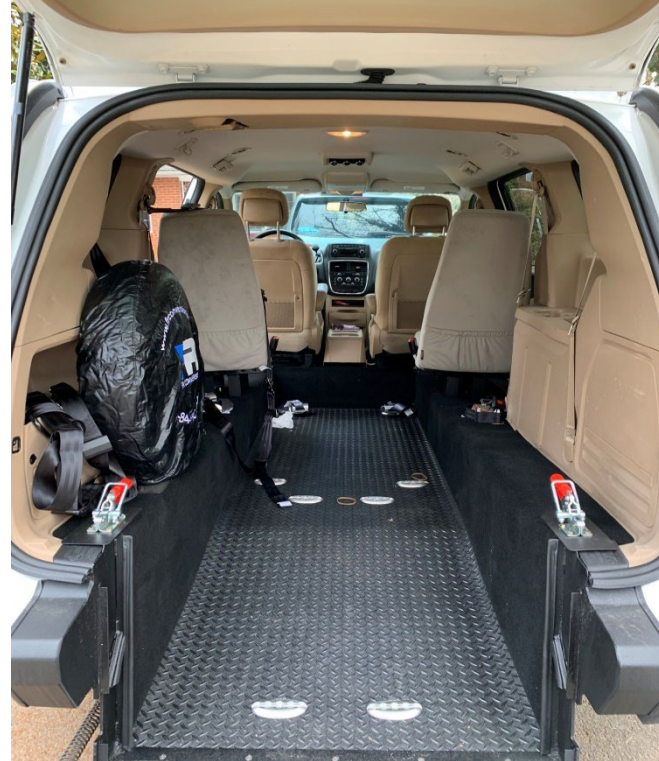
