A Tale of Two States: Expanding Quality and Access to Child Care

- The Abecedarian Project
 - Children in the experimental group received <u>full-time</u>, <u>high-quality educational intervention in a childcare setting from infancy through age 5</u>. Each child had an individualized prescription of educational "games" incorporated into the day. These activities focused on social, emotional, and cognitive areas of development but gave particular emphasis to language.
 - Researchers monitored children's progress over time with <u>follow-up studies conducted at ages</u>
 12, 15, 21, 30, and 35. The findings continue to demonstrate that important, long-lasting benefits are associated with the high-quality early childhood program.
