Colorado Case Study: How One State Is Revamping Its Early Childhood System

- <u>Colorado Department of Early Childhood</u> | Enacted legislatively in 2021 by <u>H1304</u>, the new department will create and oversee a unified early childhood system and oversee all early care and education programs.
 - Outlined in <u>H22-1295</u>, the voter-approved Colorado Universal Preschool Program will provide at least 10 hours of voluntary preschool to every child in Colorado child in the year prior to kindergarten eligibility beginning in the 2023-24 school year. It is a mixed delivery program, allowing parents to select the licensed school-based, community-based or home-based preschool program of their choice. Additional state-funded hours of care will be available to children who meet qualifying factors.
- <u>Executives Partnering to Invest in Children</u> (EPIC) | This network of business leaders is committed to a future where supporting families and children is a pathway to business success and economic growth. It includes advocates for family-friendly workplaces and policies to ensure that children are receiving the quality child care and education they need to reach their potential while enabling their parents to thrive in the workplace. - <u>Colorado's Early Childhood Leadership Commission</u> | This is Colorado's federally-authorized state advisory council for early childhood. The role of the Commission is to be a statewide leader, subject matter expert and champion of best and promising practices throughout the state.
- <u>Early Milestones Colorado</u> | This is a Colorado-based organization that advances practice, research and policy so that every community can provide an environment where children will flourish.

Home Visitation: Come on In and Take a Closer Look

Warren Village Site Visit: Two-Generation Strategies at Work

Resources:

- <u>Warren Village</u> | Through a two-generation approach, Warren Village provides opportunities and comprehensive resources to empower families to change their life trajectories. Their holistic approached includes safe and affordable housing, parent services and advocacy and early education and child care.
 - How is Warren Village Funded? Housing is primarily funded through the HAP Section 8 voucher program. The early learning center is funded through several tuition reimbursement programs including CCCAP, CO Preschool Program, Denver Preschool Program, Head Start and the USDA nutrition program with a smaller amount from parent tuition payments and contributed donations. Self-sufficiency work is funded through contributed revenue from foundations, corporations, individuals and grants.
 - <u>State Legislators from Across the Country Converge at a Denver Nonprofit</u> | Read the Rocky Mountain PBS article highlighting NCSL's Sept. 14 visit to the facility, including quotes from two Child Welfare Fellows.
- <u>Family Promise</u> | This organization works to prevent and end family homelessness by providing prevention services prior to crises, shelter when families become homeless and stabilization programs once they have secured housing to maintain independence. There are over 200 Family Promise <u>Affiliates</u> located throughout the country.
