Child welfare systems are undergoing a sea change throughout the United States as policymakers and researchers explore how to shift focus and resources to proactively *preventing* child abuse and neglect rather than primarily *reacting* when it does occur. This meeting will introduce fellows to essential concepts in an interactive peer-learning setting.

- Strengthen your knowledge of child welfare and child maltreatment prevention.
- Explore options to prevent child maltreatment and mitigate the consequences when it does occur.
- Foster new relationships among fellows, faculty and NCSL staff.

For the first time, Child Welfare Fellows will learn about and consider the relationships between child welfare, early childhood and youth homelessness through cross-over programming with Early Childhood Fellows and Youth Homelessness Fellows.
