




Mission Statement

NATIONAL GUARD HISTORY

- 1636 National Guard established, the <u>oldest military organization in</u> the <u>United States</u>; and the NG has been involved in every major war our Nation has faced.
- 1916 The National Guard transforms from individual state forces to the reserve component of the Army.
- 1947 The National Guard is designated as the reserve component of the U.S. Air Force.
- 1993 The Offsite Agreement reaffirms the National Guard as the combat reserve of the Army.
- 2012 Chief, National Guard Bureau becomes a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and the National Guard Bureau becomes a joint activity of the Department of Defense.

History of the Kentucky Guard



<u>In 1792,</u> The local militia was formally recognized as the <u>Kentucky State Militia</u> with the Militia Act of Kentucky signed by Gov. Isaac Shelby.

<u>In 1912,</u> a new federal regulation took effect transforming the Kentucky State Guard to the <u>Kentucky National Guard</u>.

<u>In 1947</u>, the federal and state government recognized air units in the formation of the Kentucky Air National Guard.

Ky Guard has answered the call to assist in natural disasters such as the <u>Great Flood of the Ohio</u> in 1937 and Hurricane <u>Katrina</u> in 2005 as well as situations of <u>civil unrest</u>, <u>snow</u> and <u>ice storms</u>, <u>tornados</u>, and planned events such as <u>Thunder</u> Over Louisville and the Kentucky Derby.







Economic Impact for 2023

- Overall Budget: \$304 Million Federal \$284 Million / State \$20 Million
- Average Member on *traditional duty* = \$10,885 per year
- 11.43% or 883 members live outside Ky. (35 states / 2 territories)
- 1,605 fulltime employees earning an average \$66,855 per year
- 7,700 Guardsmen = \$191 million to KY in Federal pay & benefits
- KYNG spent \$11 million in fed & state construction dollars in Ky.




NATIONAL GUARD DOMESTIC OPERATIONS







- Leverages military-to-military engagements and whole-ofsociety relationships to facilitate broader interagency objectives








State Partnership Program









State Partnership Program



History:

- Began in 1993 with three Baltic Republics
- All 54 States & Territories NGs participate
- 88 partnerships encompassing 100 partner natior
- KY first partnered in 1996 with Ecuador (ECU)
- KY partnered with Djibouti (DJI) in 2015



What SPP Does:

- Senior Leader Engagements
- Subject Matter Expert Exchanges
- Cooperative Training and Exercises
- Leader Development



FY23 Highlights:

- KYNG conducted 14 engagements with ECU
- KYNG conducted 13 engagements with DJI
- Events focused on aviation & ground vehicle maintenance, medical, logistics, engineering operational planning, and professional development
- MG Lamberton met with DJI delegation in Kentucky
- MG Lamberton met ECU military leadership in Ecuador
- Additional focus on HA/DR operations, cyber defense and communications
- Increased SPP size to 3 personnel, 2 full-time technicians and 1 indefinite technician
