

BUILD A COMMISSION

Establish and facilitate a high-level, diverse Commission to develop a research agenda and reach consensus on findings and actionable policy recommendations

CONDUCT RESEARCH AND OUTREACH

Engage respected researchers to establish key facts that guide the Commission's deliberations, along with field hearings and site visits to gather testimony from veterans and other stakeholders

DISSEMINATE FINDINGS

Aggressively disseminate findings and recommendations via multiple channels to the public, CCJ members, the field at large, key agencies, and national policymaker and practitioner organizations

Transition from Military Service – Recommendations

- 1. DoD make successful transition a priority mission
 - Validated risk-needs assessment
 - Joint Transition Centers
- 2. DoD integrate evidence-based practices
- 3. VA 1944 GI Bill; automated healthcare records & nationwide enrollment in VA health care



Transition from Military Service

DoD - make successful transition a priority mission

5X

The proportion of veterans receiving an other than honorable discharge has increased fivefold since World War II. 6%

Veterans with other than honorable discharges make up approximately 6% of all discharges ...

18%

but 18% of all incarcerated veterans.

3X

Veterans with other than honorable discharges are three times more likely to be at risk of suicide than veterans with honorable discharges.




Arrest through Sentencing – Recommendations

- 1. Define and identify veterans in CJ system
- 2. Incentivize and improve veterans' diversion from incarceration
 - Model Policy Framework Committee
- 3. Create the National Center for Veterans Justice

Rationale for the Framework



Recommendation: Federal & state governments should adopt statutory frameworks that incentivize and improve veterans' diversion, deferred adjudication, participation in treatment courts, sentencing mitigation, & record clearance.

Why is this needed to complement existing Veterans Courts?

- 1. Many veterans cannot access a Veterans Treatment Court (VTC).
 - 6.8M veterans live in a county without a VTC
 - DOJ: VTCs designed to serve only 10-15% of justice-involved veterans
 - 25% of VTCs require "honorable" discharge; 43% bar violent offenses
- 2. VTCs vary widely in their practices; some lack significant legal incentives.
- 3. VTCs are resource-intensive and difficult to scale.



VJC Model Policy Framework

Establish state public policy to:

Recognize the burdens veterans carry from military service, and provide pathways to treatment & healing via justice system intervention.

- 1. Broad Eligibility Criteria & Judicial Discretion
 - Maximizes participation / judges determine eligibility & terms of supervision
- 2. Standardized Veteran Sentencing Option (VSO)
 - For probation-eligible charges: pre-trial/probation with treatment instead of conviction/incarceration
- 3. Evidence-based Case Plan Approach
 - Implements evidence-based standards used by accountability courts



Nebraska is First to Adopt

- Several states filed bills related to the VJC Model Policy Framework in spring 2024
- Nebraska requested technical assistance from VJC in February and the legislature unanimously adopted LB 253 in April 2024



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
Corrections and Re-entry Advisory Committee

- Recently concluded & Commission report release in Sept
- Explored challenges of current & former incarcerated veterans
 Specialized veterans housing units
 - Healthcare
 - "Second Look" policies (original judge reconsideration)
 - Barriers to re-entry: housing and debt from VA overpayment
 - Technology and corporate policies (education and hiring)



Corporate hiring policy for "Second Chance Veterans"

- Developing sample policy for companies.
- Seeking examples of "best practices" for hiring policies that target Second Chance + Veteran populations.
- Collaborating with Second Chance Business Coalition
